Departure Lounge Festival -Package Holiday 2017

Vanessa Macauley – recipient of Derby Theatre's central to the main theme of her work and it is Departure Lounge Festival - Package Holiday 2017 was in residence at The Hopbarn from Monday 10th to Saturday 15th July working on her one women creation How to Make an Enticement Machine.

This is a work that does not hold back and offers a rather ugly and somewhat disturbing portrayal of how the female black body is depicted in popular culture. From music videos to Youtube tutorials that give make up tips and the outlandish fashion often associated with both, Vanessa's work is satirical in its delivery but offers a dark and tragic undertone of how far people must go in order to conform and fit in with popular expectations.

For Vanessa, the association of the female black body as the embodiment of erotic desire is here that she focuses all of her energy, peppering the audience with the reality of what she is dealing with. This includes a lengthy and rather cringing recital of popular lyrics. Highly sexualised in nature, using crude and grotesque language, the sudden impact of the barrage of such lyrics jolts the audience members into paying attention. As time passes and the lyrics continue to be read followed by the scrunching and throwing away of the paper they were written on, we become somewhat desensitized by what we hear. In such and to draw parallels to the popular culture that Vanessa is focussing our attention on, we begin to accept this as the norm and feel less and less embarrassed by what we are hearing.

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How to Make an Enticement Machine tackles head on the acceptance of conforming to such sub-culture and embracing its popularity even if it means adopting highly sexualised mannerisms and a iron clad immunity to the misogynist depiction of black women. It is a work that focus's primarily on young black women in today's society, although there are also connotations for all ethnic groups especially those that are also required to adopt a specific image in order to fit in with the crowd.

The work which featured as part of Derby Theatre's Departure Lounge Festival has the potential to go further (if audience members can stomach its content) and Vanessa offers both a brave and courageous performance.

Summer Blues. Roots & Jazz

Clearly enjoying her debut, Leona captivated the audience and the other band members with her distinct voice. Pino's exceptional sax and clarinet brought subtlety and prowess to the group, one that provided a much needed musical element to the set pieces. Not to be surpassed, new drummer Kip matched the other musicians with an extremely empathetic drumming technique; often the drumming either drowns out the other band members or fails to be heard himself. With Kip, the balance was perfect, again a testamont to his ability and expertise as a drummer.

Our August Feature

Boileroom Theatre Company Sanguine Night by Bushra Laskar

Following their residency at The HopBarn in June, Boileroom Theatre Company premiered Sanguine Night by Bushra Laskar as part of RADA Festival in early July.



The HopBarn was delighted to be able to support this production and here is what the playwrite Bushra Laskar said about the experience the company had whilst in residence at The HopBarn.



Sanguine Night is a timely new play about the Bhopal Union Carbide disaster of 1984 that killed over 3000 People. Developed by Boileroom Theatre Company and produced to coincide with the 70th Anniversary of the Partition of India, this bold multimedia production asks: how can we make up for so much tragedy.



"A week in a working farm wasn't a setting any of us had imagined for the development of Sanguine Night, but for the team of actors and creatives it was a rewarding alternative to the London scene, and completely removed all the stress of commuting, punctuality and city life.

The HopBarn is a beautiful place, a studio with the space to focus and create, while the bucolic surrounds and animal neighbours were a delightful distraction, especially the gorgeous dog, who was always willing to play!

Having the HopBarn as a space to call home while we negotiated a complex and evolving play was a huge gift to its development. Up until recently we have been snatching bits of time and space around various theatres and rehearsal venues around

London, and though we are very grateful for the support we have been offered, it has been a piecemeal rehearsal process. The Hopbarn experience has given us the continuity we so needed. It is a place full of light and opportunity for getting fresh air - a God send when you spend your days working on a piece which immerses you in such a dark and heavy subject as the death and exploitation of thousands of people at the hand of corporate negligence.



As we are working towards the first fully staged work in progress performances of Sanguine Night early next month, it's hugely important that we consolidate all of the hard work the team have brought to the table over the past several weeks before we present to an audience. The HopBarn was a chance for us to really get stuck in and focus, as well as for the all female ensemble to live as a family on a large and isolated estate, much like the characters in the play itself. The actors play three generations of women in a grand but deteriorating mansion in central India and the HopBarn gave them a chance to build personal and working bonds with their fellow cast members in a relaxed and inspiring setting. It also meant we could spend our down time discussing the themes of the play and addressing questions without an eye on the clock. They loved being able to share evening meals and walks around the grounds - it was a real luxury that all emerging theatre companies could do with".
