The enigmatic singer-songwriter has amassed a huge fan base following his long career and importantly, has managed to set himself apart from such singers as Bruce Springsteen, John Mayer and Bruce Cockburn amongst others who he has often been compared to. Martyn Joseph appeals because he sings what he believes, a social and political anarchist who is not afraid to confront the problems of society head on, believing strongly in a social change being driven by the young. He himself is not afraid to admit that his generation (including himself) has failed the next, and for this, he strongly advocates for anyone who is younger to take action and impose accountability on those that govern us and who have caused such in-equality in society.

TrueBlue Music -

A fond thank you, farewell and good luck for the future.



As with many things in life and most certainly in the arts, success is most often due to being in the right place at the right time. For professional musicians, actors and dancers, getting their first big break is perhaps the most challenging. This is in many ways the absolute truth behind the successful music programming at The HopBarn and when Stuart Poole decided one day to convert an old falling down barn into a music venue, the thought of 'how do we go about programming' was in essence thought about only when the buildings were finally renovated.

A chance encounter however one night at a concert in a local village hall would prove to be invaluable to The HopBarn's existence and would lead to both a mutual and beneficial arrangement between two music lovers.

Vince Ion began TrueBlue Music 5 years ago.

Initially the idea was a 'grow your own gig'; done from TrueBlue Music and the music to raise money for Theatre Imp's production of Jerusalem. The first gig promoted was Steve Knightly at The British Horological Society on 1st February 2015, and it was so successful that TrueBlue Music was formed. Vince then went on to promote further gigs either at The Horological Society, the Assembly Rooms in Lincoln and crucially The HopBarn.

This incredible relationship between TrueBlue Music and The HopBarn has without doubt built the programming foundations for this small rural arts venue, and without Vince's continued support and working partnership, it would not have been possible to have built up such a reputation that The HopBarn has acquired. The HopBarn is therefore indebted to Vince and to TrueBlue Music for continuing to programme regular events at this venue.

Over the past five years, Vince has brought an exceptional array of quality music and has advocated for an extensive range of roots and folk from artists ranging from Luke Jackson, Sunjay, Phil Beer, Miranda Sykes, Steve Knightly, Claude Bourdon, Daisy Chapman, Chris and Denny, Sam Carter, Winter Wilson, Plum Hall and the Red Dirt Skinners. This also includes the countless poets who have supported these exceptional musicians and have read their own work prior to and during each gig.

It is crucially important to highlight that all the above artists mentioned are recognised singer-songwriters in their own right and each perform their own work.

A further testament to Vince's motivation behind TrueBlue Music, is also to recognise his contribution to charity. Following the initial gig in February 2015, the proceeds from each gig have all gone to Beaumond House Community Hospice in Newark. This important charity provides palliative care and support to patients with life limiting or terminal illness and their families living in the Newark and Sherwood District.

Vince is unable to put a final figure, although he believes that almost £3,000 has been raised promotions in support of the important work that Beaumond House undertakes.

Unfortunately however, Vince has decided that the time is right to end with TrueBlue Music. It's been an exceptional relationship, one that has benefited The HopBarn greatly so it only seems natural to offer our sincere gratitude to Vince for all he has done and wish him well for the future.....he's going to need it we think!

The Refugee Doctor Project

In answer to the growing need of medical doctors in this country, Vince is leading on an creative and ingenious way to fill the shortage of trained NHS doctors able to practice legally in this country, although his area is restricted only to Lincolnshire. This model however could be expanded nationally if proved successful.

The BMA has calculated that it costs approximately £300,000 to train 1 foundation year doctor in this country. In comparison it costs just £25,000 to train a qualified doctor from a foreign country and who is considered a refugee. The Refugee Doctor Project, is a charity headed by Vince Ion, that is seeking to support the training of refugee doctors in order to fill a workforce gap in the NHS.

This project is in many ways crucial to the long term survival of a quality health service provided by the NHS and it is only right that Vince is allowed to focus all his energy and resources on this unique opportunity.

Nick Drake is the most revered and loved of all this country's singer/songwriters. He recorded three cherished Albums between 1969 and 1972 but was almost entirely unknown in his day. After his tragic death in 1974, aged only 26, his music almost disappeared into obscurity.
